APPENDIX 4: SPELLING AND SPEAKING

- a consonants and vowels in speaking: When you put one part of the mouth on or near another part of the mouth, you are making a consonant sound. When you do not do this, you are making a vowel sound.
- **b** consonants and vowels in spelling:

the letters **a** e i o always show a vowel sound (or part of it).

the letter **u** usually shows a vowel sound (or part of it) – **under, sound** – but, at the beginning of a word, it can sometimes show a consonant sound – **use, university.**

the letters \mathbf{w} and \mathbf{y} show a consonant sound at the beginning of a word – with, young – but a vowel sound at the end – grow, happy.

the other letters in the alphabets are always consonants.

C In every word with more than one part, one part of the word usually sounds stronger than the other part. This strong part is called **stress**:
